
Raffle Baskets: Barb Borgens is coordinating raffle basket donations. See page 4 for details.

2010 Budget Process

The Trustees will present a draft of the budget plan to the Church Council meeting on September 22. There will be a Town Hall Meeting for further budget discussion on November I, before a Congregational Meeting to adopt the working budget on November 15. Pastor's Pen

As I shared with some of you on my first Sunday back in the pulpit, August 23rd, I have had many folk ask me "what have you learned?"

Some things I have "re-learned". I have re-learned that I need not be a slave to time. I took off my wrist watch for three months and enjoyed it! I learned that I still love detective novels, still enjoy bike riding, and still can be shocked silent by beauty, and by grief. I have relearned the importance of relationships. I was given the opportunity to re-focus on the intricate web of relationships within which I live during my sabbatical. I had considered that the time of my sabbatical would be "pilgrim" time, traveling and exploring with the eyes and the heart of a pilgrim, someone who is seeking the Holy One wherever she goes.

I found awareness of God in so many places! Yes, of course, at Kamiak Butte, and along the edge of the Grand Canyon. Certainly, on the shores of Lake Coeur d'Alene on a star studded summer night. But in my pilgrim journey I also felt the touch of the Holy One in the embrace of a long ago elementary school friend and in the stories told of my great-grandfather and great-grandmother while sitting around a table in Germany that was covered in old sepia photographs. I visited with friends and with relations whom I had not seen since I was a little girl and was amazed and grateful at the openness of each person's heart.

My awareness of the Holy Presence came in and through the vividness of stories and laughter, and yes, tears too. I lavished time on my family and on my friends, and I gloried in hours and days spent among the flowers, the bugs, the camping sites, the songs of strange birds, the silence of time alone.

Since I was given the gift of being a pilgrim in this sab-batical time, I found I was a pilgrim of the seemingly small and insignificant revelations of God's presence, found everywhere and among everyone I met. In relationships that were in crisis, in old old friendships, among the elders of my clan, and with my own children; I realized how the web of my life was woven together with others. The treasure of "family ties" became more precious to me. Remembering the life that I share with you, I felt the web of our relationships more strongly, more keenly. Your friendship, your care and concern are also gifts of relationship that I treasure. Your love and labors here at Westminster are a bulwark against the aching loneliness of our cul-

ture and our age. Though we may disagree, and argue, and find frustration in our time together, we also have love and community, patience and compassion with one another. In relationship with all of you, I come to know God better on my pilgrim journey. I thank you for giving me the time to re-learn this important truth. Pastor Andy
